RIGHT FOR YOU?



Paraprofessionals provide instructional supports and services for students within a school setting. A special education paraprofessional is a person who works with one or more students with disabilities under the direction of a teacher. Paraprofessionals may be known by various titles, including a teacher's aide, teacher assistant, paraeducator, one-to-one aide, instructional assistant, or job coach.

In Pennsylvania, there are two types of paraprofessionals that work with students with disabilities: instructional paraprofessionals and personal care assistants (PCAs).



Instructional Paraprofessionals

- Work under the guidance of both general and special education teachers
- Lead activities during individual or small group time
- Collaborate with related service personnel to support the carryover of academic skills to other areas of the student's life
- Assist the teacher in observing, recording and charting behavior



Personal Care Assistants (PCAs)

- Provide one-to-one, noninstructional support to individual students in the classroom, hallways, cafeteria, and recreational areas
- Assist students with therapy programs designed by speech and language pathologists, occupational therapists, or physical therapists
- Monitor the student's safety, redirect behavior, and assist in the use and care of equipment

HOW TO BECOME A PARAPROFESSIONAL IN PENNSYLVANIA:

In Pennsylvania, there are three options to become a paraprofessional:

OPTION 1

Complete 2 years of postsecondary education (48 college/university credits).

OPTION 2

Possess an associate degree or higher.

OPTION 3

Successfully complete a state or locally developed assessment. The Credential of Competency for Special Education Paraeducators in Pennsylvania is one way to meet this requirement through the use of the *Pennsylvania Credential of Competency Checklist*, which ensures competence in ten performance-based standard areas.
