Activity 2.5: Communication in the Digital Age Time: 45 minutes

Purpose

To discuss ways in which educators communicate with families about a variety of subjects and to determine whether digital or non-digital means of communication are used, and whether changes of means of communication could, perhaps, enhance the communicative process.

Materials Needed

- Modes of Communication Chart (attached)
- Computers with Internet access to access school website (optional)

Roles

- 1. Facilitator: Explain the activity and lead the follow-up discussion.
- 2. Participants: Work in pairs to discuss communication practices but complete sheets individually and be prepared to share findings with the large group.

Activity

- 1. The facilitator should direct the participants to count off in pairs.
- 2. Each participant should receive a copy of the Modes of Communication Chart.
- 3. Allow 20 minutes for participants to discuss and record answers to the questions on the Modes of Communication Chart.
- 4. Bring the group together to share and discuss their findings.

Possible facilitator questions:

- 1. Which modes of communication do you use more regularly?
- 2. What communication types do you feel are most successful in your school or classroom?
- 3. What ways could you change your communication strategies to further enhance and develop home-school communication?
- 4. How can this information be used to enhance communications with family members?
