# Activity 5.4: Promoting Shared Decision-Making Time: 30 minutes 

## Purpose

To develop a plan to authentically involve families in decision-making.

## Materials Needed

- Promoting Shared Decision-Making Worksheet (attached)


## Roles

I. Facilitator: Lead activity and guide follow-up discussion.
2. Participants: Work in groups to discuss and answer the questions on the Promoting Shared Decision-Making worksheet.

## Activity

I. The facilitator will divide the group into small groups so all members of the group can actively participate in the discussions.
2. Each group is to discuss each section of the worksheet and use the information shared throughout the module as well as information from their school/district to respond.
3. Once completed, ask the groups to report out on their work. The facilitator can capture key conversational points on the facilitator debriefing worksheet and share responses with the administrative team as appropriate.
