

WHAT IS A TEACHER OF THE DEAF (ToD)?

A teacher of the deaf (ToD) provides educational services and supports to students who are deaf or hard of hearing. When communicating with students who are deaf or hard of hearing, a ToD will use the student's primary communication method (e.g., listening and speaking, sign language). These supports and services can be provided to individual students, a small group of students, or an entire classroom.

IN ADDITION TO TEACHING, WHAT DOES A TEACHER OF THE DEAF DO?

- Collect data and write reports on the progress of students for families and educational staff.
- Troubleshoot on how to use and maintain equipment, such as hearing aids and cochlear implants.
- Work with others so classrooms, materials, and instruction are understandable by the students.

WHERE COULD YOU WORK AS A TEACHER OF THE DEAF?

A ToD may teach in one specific classroom or in multiple settings throughout the day.

In a specific classroom (a school-based position), a ToD could:

- Have a classroom of students who are deaf or hard of hearing,
- Teach core content like English language arts, science, or math, and
- Support students who participate in general education classes.

In multiple settings (an itinerant position), a ToD could:

- Travel between schools to provide services for children who are deaf or hard of hearing,
- Work in one school district, several different districts, or on the county level through an intermediate unit or an agency, and
- Provide services in homes or hospitals.

HOW TO BECOME A TEACHER OF THE DEAF IN PENNSYLVANIA:

There are currently three preparation programs for those seeking to become a Teacher of the Deaf.

Bachelor of Science:

Pursue a degree (Early Childhood PK-4/Deaf and Hard of Hearing N-12) to teach students in grades PK-12th grade who have a hearing loss, as well as hearing students in grades PK-4th grade.

PennWest University – Edinboro

Master of Science:

First, earn a bachelor's degree from a college or university. Then, enroll in the graduate program in Deaf and Hard of Hearing Education PK-12 at St. Joseph's University. This program is offered fully online.
