

WHAT IS AN EDUCATIONAL INTERPRETER?

An educational interpreter uses sign language and spoken language to provide communication access for a student who is deaf or hard of hearing, in their educational setting. This includes classroom instruction, teacher and student conversations, announcements, and relevant environmental sound information (like the signal for class changing). A primary responsibility of an educational interpreter is to make sure the student understands and comprehends the information being taught and has access to all activities and opportunities in their educational setting.

WHAT MIGHT YOU DO AS AN EDUCATIONAL INTERPRETER?



WITH STUDENTS, you might:

- Interpret in a language and/or mode that matches the student's communication need.
- Model social strategies to encourage interaction between students who use sign language and those who do not.
- Provide communication access to all school events like sports, field trips, and assemblies.



WITH SCHOOL PERSONNEL, you might:

- Work with classroom teachers to provide communication access so the student who is deaf or hard of hearing can participate with their peers.
- Share information with school personnel about the roles and responsibilities of the interpreter.
- Participate in meetings as part of the student's educational team.

HOW TO BECOME AN EDUCATIONAL INTERPRETER IN PENNSYLVANIA:

The two most common pathways to becoming an educational interpreter include:

OPTION 1 - Pursue an associate's degree from either Community College of Allegheny County or Community College of Philadelphia.

OPTION 2 - Pursue a bachelor's degree from either Commonwealth University at Bloomsburg or Mount Aloysius College.

After completing an interpreter training program, you must take the Educational Interpreter Performance Assessment (EIPA) test and score a minimum of a 3.5 out of 5 in order to work as an educational interpreter in Pennsylvania schools.
