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Definition of “Team”

Merriam Webster’s definition of “Team”

- “A group of people who compete in a sport, game, etc., against another group.”
- “A group of two or more animals used to pull a wagon, cart, etc.”
- “A group of people who work together.”

Descriptions of Effective Teamwork

Coordinated- Sharing of information so each person can facilitate their part of the group's goal.

- Efficient
- Top/Down Leadership- "I know what to do and when to do it."
- Different Values- "The guy next to me though this would be impressive."

Cooperative- Each team member assists to meet each other's goal rather than a shared goal.

- Common effort
- Beginning to develop trust
- Hierarchy of power

...Interdependence

- Sharing of expertise to create a multi-faceted, comprehensive, whole-child approach to the educational program.
 - Equal distribution of work.
 - Everyone's ideas are valued.
 - Accountable to each other for the *success of the team and the child*.

...Shared ~~Planning~~ Processing Time

- Piecing together from part to whole.
- Managing the flow of information.

The Essential Elements of The Educational Needs of a Child with Deaf-Blindness

...Shared Resources

- Access to experiences
- Purposeful/meaningful instruction due to lack of incidental learning

The Essential Elements of The Educational Needs of a Child with Deaf-Blindness

...Shared Leadership

- Opportunities for turn-taking, reciprocal interactions
- Building instruction based on the child's strengths, their interests, their lead

...Shared Meaningful Goals

& Unity of Purpose

- Meaningful instruction in an a natural context
- Understands purpose of activity
- Requisite skills and concepts

- Develop trust through routines
- Consistent outcomes
- Child's communication/behavior is valued

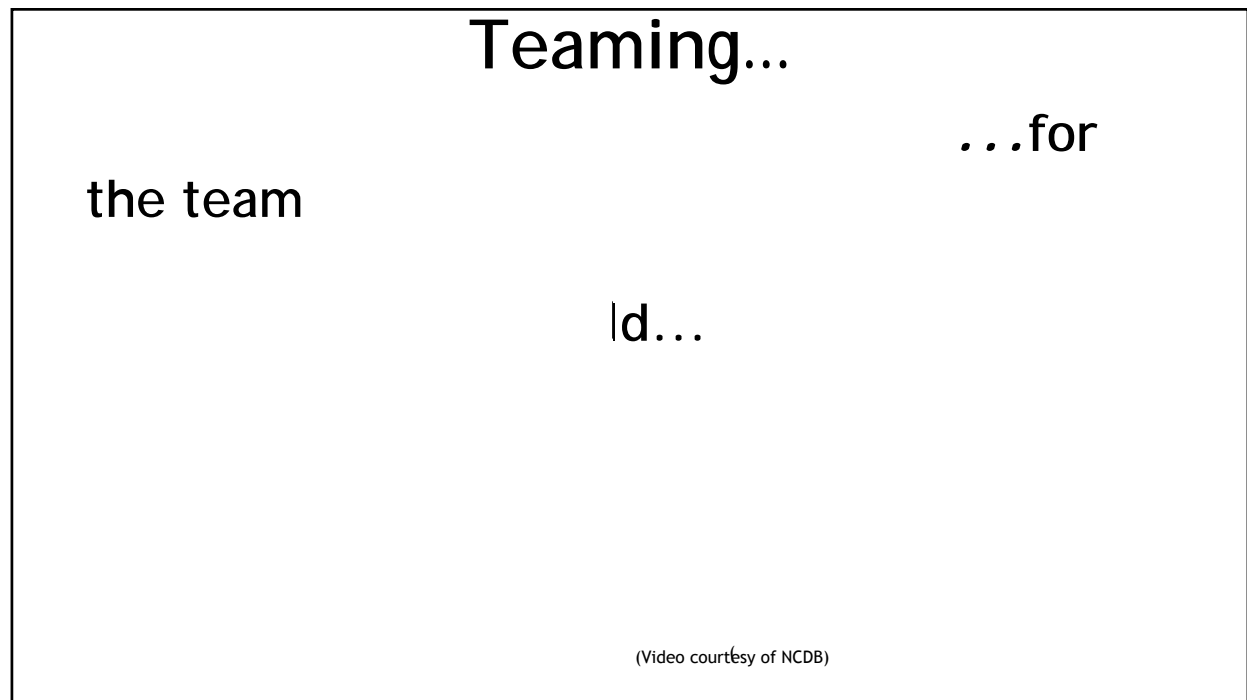
...Interdependence

Outcomes of Collaborative Teaming

- Shared goals leads to a consistent, predictable educational program.
 - Shared resources and expertise keeps everyone “in the loop” regarding best practices to meet the needs of the child.
 - Trusted relationships between team members builds constructive communication focused on the educational success of the child.

The Transdisciplinary vs. Multidisciplinary Team Model for Assessment and Instruction

Transdisciplinary vs. Multidisciplinary

Multidisciplinary:

- Team members assess/develop IEP goals/provide instruction independently.
 - Instruction generally follows the “pull-out” method.
 - Team members may meet occasionally to report progress.
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Transdisciplinary vs. Multidisciplinary

Transdisciplinary:

- Collaborates on assessments across natural settings.

Transdisciplinary vs. Multidisciplinary

Transdisciplinary:

- Collaborates on IEP goals.
- Provides integrated service delivery in the classroom.
 - Direct instruction/Team instruction
 - Model/coach other team members through instruction
 - Routines are used across disciplines and instruction to provide consistency and repetition.

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Transdisciplinary vs. Multidisciplinary

Transdisciplinary:

- Progress Monitoring of goals and objectives is shared by all team members.
- Teams meet regularly to develop collaborative strategies of instruction.

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Collaborative Team Meetings

- Accountability to the team/student is valued.
- Everyone actively participates.
- Seek out consensus.
- Set ground rules and follow them consistently.
- Build time for celebrating success.
- Utilize shared roles and responsibilities.

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Collaborative Team Meetings

Roles and Responsibilities:

- Leader
 - Develops agenda
 - Runs the meetings, sticks to agenda
 - Checks in with other roles to maintain meeting.
 - Sets date for next meeting.
 - Assigns roles for next meeting.
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Collaborative Team Meetings

Roles and Responsibilities:

- Facilitator
 - Makes sure participants follow pre-determined ground rules
 - Maintains order
 - Encourages participation by everyone
 - Offers reflections/summarizations at end of meeting
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Collaborative Team Meetings

Roles and Responsibilities:

- Recorder/Notetaker/Scribe
 - Records who is in attendance
 - Takes notes of meeting
 - Checks in with participants to make sure notes are accurate
 - Disseminates notes
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Collaborative Team Meetings

Roles and Responsibilities:

- Timekeeper
 - Hold time for the meeting
 - Keeps time spend on each agenda item in check
 - Keeps meeting to prescribed time
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Collaborative Team Meetings

Roles and Responsibilities:

- Participants
 - Stay on topic
 - Participate fully
 - Are good listeners
 - Keep criticism constructive
