Complex Needs

Combination of special needs that require intensive supports:

- Hearing loss and/or visual impairment, and
- Medical and health conditions, and/or
- Physical impairments, and/or
- Developmental delays



Interdisciplinary Teaming

Family

Depends on child's complex needs:

- Medical/health
- Vision and hearing specialists
- Occupational and physical therapists
- Speech and language pathologists
- Behavior specialists
- Psychologists
- Nutritionist

- Family CPR
- Professional input

Influence of Hearing Loss in Early Years



- Social emotional development
- Communication development
- Language and early literacy development

Access to Sound



- Medical interventions
- Amplification
- Increase signal-noise ratio
- Making sound meaningful

Access to Communication



- Social interaction
- Mutually understood form
- Content or topic
- Purpose

Use of Selected Prompts

- Auditory cues
- Olfactory cues
- Visual cues
- Tactile cues (handouts)



- Hand-over-hand guidance
- Hand-under-hand guidance

Selected Strategies to Promote Communication

- Observe and interpret child's signals
- Identify child's preferences
- Establish predictable routines
- Establish turn-taking
- Support communicative initiations





Challenges to High Quality Services

Service Providers

- Lack of training and experience
- Traditional roles
- Discipline-specific focus
- Barriers to teaming
- Lack of time and flexibility

Child

- Unique and complex
- Requires individualized & integrated approach
- Takes time to demonstrate knowledge and skills

Effective Practices for Service Providers

- Identify and use resources
- Update professional knowledge and skills
- Implement evidence-based practices
- Be respectful and collaborative
- Share expertise
- Listen and be open to learning
- Maintain open communication
- Adopt an attitude of inquiry
- Keep meaningful child and family outcomes in mind
