Your letter to President Clinton, dated April 20, 1997, has been forwarded to the Office of Special Education Programs (OSEP) within the U.S. Department of Education for response. OSEP administers Part B of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (Part B), which makes Federal funds available to States, and through them to local school districts, to assist in providing a free appropriate public education (FAPE) to students with disabilities in mandated age ranges. We are sorry to learn of the difficulties that your , has experienced in receiving what you believe to be appropriate educational services. Please excuse the delay in our response to your inquiry.

In your letter to President Clinton, you indicate that has a learning disability and was attending Technical Institute which was to implement individualized education Program (IEP. Apparently, was placed at the Institute by the School District (District) in order to provide with FAPE. However, in February 1997, because of 's breach of a student behavior contract which signed and in which agreed would not be absent from school from November 21 through that the end of the school year for more than ten school days, was told could no longer attend the Institute. Assuming the breach was not a manifestation of disability, and continued to be provided FAPE by the District, we do not believe

that the Institute's refusal to allow to attend its program would violate Part B or other statutes administered by the Department. The District remains responsible for making FAPE available to by other means, including addressing the reasons for 's lack of attendance at school.

Although we do not have enough information to ascertain whether Part B requirements have been properly addressed in your situation, I would like to point out that as a parent of a child with a disability, you may request mediation or initiate an impartial due process hearing if you believe that your has been denied FADE by the District. In New Jersey, is entitled to receive FADE until graduates from high school or reaches age 21, whichever occurs first.
